The St. Martin's 2-Step

"Love each other." Love, again? Don't you Christians ever talk about anything other than love? Love. Love . Love. No, wait ... that's The Beatles. As right as the Beatles may have been about some things, they were wrong about at least one thing: love is *not* all you need. Jesus knew that we all need more than love. We need compassion. This is how it goes in the Jesus playbook:

1. Love one another
2. Because you will love imperfectly, despite your best efforts, have compassion on one another.

Upon what basis do I make this assertive claim? Re-read the Gospel of John, chapter 13, verses 34-38 (CEB):


"I give you a new commandment: Love each other. Just as I have loved you, so you must love each other." (34)

Then, immediately afterward, in verses 36-38, Jesus gives an example of how spectacularly they will fail to love each other. Jesus tells Peter that he knows Peter will desert him, an awful example indeed of failing in the act of loving. It's no accident that Holy Scriptures gives us Jesus' own understanding that human failure happens directly after the "love one another" instruction. That's what makes this a 2-part instruction: 1) love each other and then, when your love is imperfect or someone receives your love imperfectly, 2) practice compassion.

One of the charisms I love about St. Martin's Episcopal Church is that, we are willing to be truthful about the human state and recognize what Jesus recognized, that because we will love imperfectly, we need a step #2. We are becoming more and more comfortable with having honest conversations that sound like this: I tried to do this, I tried to love in this way, and it didn't work out so well; and the answering voice from someone else in the congregation says, yes, you're right, that didn't work out so well. Let's try again. In other words "messing up" or a failure in communication or a project that falls short of the goal is not a moral failing; it's simply an invitation to be compassionate and to love again, to try again.

Communities that are *not afraid* are communities that achieve amazing things. More than that, communities that are not afraid (not afraid to set an audacious goal for fear it won't be attained, not afraid to love for fear of rejection, not afraid to start something good for fear of not being able to continue it forever) are communities in which the Kingdom of God is revealed as already present and powerful in the world.

As we embark on a new program year, I encourage you to join me in doing the St. Martin's 2-Step: 1) love each other and 2) practice compassion. This is all we need.

Celebrate and Make a Difference at the Ministry Faire

In Recognition of a Lifetime of Service to the Church and Bravery During Life's Transitions

I have been inspired by so many examples at St. Martin's Church of people who have served the church over the course of their lives, in various capacities and are now facing the challenges of their elder years with courage and grace. In recognition of their inspiring examples, I am instituting The Order of the Compass Rose, to be awarded by the rector of St. Martin's to those persons who meet these two criteria. Each recipient will be given an Anglican Compass Rose in gratitude for their service and as a symbol of their faith to take with them wherever life leads.

The ritual action of awarding an honor is deeply rooted in our Anglican tradition although my direct inspiration is The Order of The Garter, which has been awarded by the British monarch since 1348. It is an outward and visible sign of the fidelity shared between the person awarded the honor and the institution making the award. I have chosen the Compass Rose as the symbol because it portrays traditional images of Anglican Christianity while also representing that the persons awarded will continue to take Christ's ministry with them wherever they may go. At the center of the emblem is the red cross of St. George on a silver shield, a reminder of the origins of the Anglican Communion in the Church of England. Encircling the cross is a band bearing the New Testament Greek inscription, "The truth shall make you free." The points of a compass reflect the spread of the Anglican Communion throughout the world. The miter at the top indicates the role of the episcopacy and Anglican order which are at the heart of the traditions of the Churches of the Communion.




Contemplative Prayer ... the Breath of Life

Save the Date for prayer that will create a space for your peace, relaxation and deep nourishment. Several forms of prayer are classic to Christian tradition to help people quietly connect with God's presence in a supportive group environment that prioritizes silence, gentleness, and imagination. One of these forms of Contemplative Prayer will be led by an experienced guide every Thursday from 12 noon to 1 p.m. with time at the beginning and ending of the hour for people to come from jobs and return to them. Each Contemplative Prayer session will begin in the Zig-Zag building, classroom 1, which is the room closest to the church sanctuary in the building adjacent to the church and the memorial garden. We shall begin with alternating two types of contemplative prayer, Centering Prayer and Lectio Divina. If you are interesting in learning more, please contact Rev'd Shirley before the first date on Thursday, Sept. 11, so we know to expect you and so that I can provide you with background information to help you get oriented. There is no need to attend every Thursday although it is one of those things where regularity of practice gives you great benefit.

Save the Date for ... Internationally Acclaimed Martin Smith. November 8 and 9, 2014

Plan on taking the opportunity to experience one of the most highly regarded spiritual teachers in the Episcopal Church, the Rev'd Martin Smith, the weekend of Nov. 8 and 9th, at St. Martin's Episcopal Church. On Saturday, Nov. 8, Martin will lead a workshop, starting at 2 p.m. and ending at 4:30 p.m. The workshop is called "Opening the Unusual Door. During the session, Martin will lead us in teaching, experimentation and discussion about finding God's hidden presence in the less familiar places of our experience. He is well known throughout the Episcopal Church and beyond as writer, retreat leader, and teacher exploring contemporary spirituality. His widely read books include Reconciliation, A Season for the Spirit, The Word is Very Near You and Compass and Stars. A priest since 1971, he most recently served as the Senior Associate Rector at St Columba's church in Washington, D.C., the largest parish in the Diocese of Washington, while continuing to travel widely to preach and teach. He retired in 2012 to devote himself to his roving ministry of spiritual formation. On Sunday, Nov. 9, Martin will be our guest preacher at the 8 and 11 a.m. services as we celebrate our church's feast day, giving thanks for the Christian witness of Martin of Tours.

Anniversary

About a year ago, I said one of those prayers that asked God to direct and use me for His purposes. As an ultimate leap of faith, I actually quit my job and decided to trust in that prayer. To my surprise and gratitude, the Holy Spirit did just that! I came to St. Martin's one day to toss some ideas around with Shirley. While we spoke the conversation took a subtle shift and she told me that she was working on a pressing need to determine what the church's role might be as our population ages. More calls were coming into the church, from parishioners who either are elderly, their children, or other concerned friends. Shirley, being Shirley, prayed about it, and began to seek a path. She and Diane Langhorst were in the process of developing an interview tool which would help to determine what daily living needs our parishioners were facing. I said I would be happy to help, until I found a different job, since I needed to keep working.

Not long after this conversation, William Knipfer, in his nineties, still living in his boyhood home, passed away. He blessed his niece, Carolyn, with an inheritance, which she chose to donate to St. Martin's to help seniors like her godfather. This was just the donation that Shirley had prayed for. Her goal was to create a program that would:

- create a listing of community supports
- visit seniors in their homes, and have conversations about what their present needs might be
- provide them with information about what was available that could help them to age safely in their own homes.
- We would also explore relationships and ideas with other parishes in the Greater Williamsburg area.

The small donation which was meant to last four months, was like the loaves and the fish. It lasted a year! I visited about 30 parishioners and spoke to many more family members. St. Martin's now has a Senior Pastoral Web page with a Community Services Directory, articles, and announcements. We have also shared our model with Faith in Action, for them to be able to expand the program to other churches and civic organizations. In the process of researching and visiting community programs, we became involved with the Senior Services Coalition's Faith Outreach Task Force. As a result of this collaboration, St. Martin's will be

hosting a new monthly Community Café open to anyone 60+. See info in the bulletin or visit the [Senior Pastoral Care Page](#). The program grew when I joined the Home Communion pastoral team and began to include Home Communion on my visits.

I've saved the true miracles for last. When you pray to the Holy Spirit to guide your life, you never know what to expect. But I can honestly say, expect blessings! Visiting with parishioners, representing St. Martin's in the community, and being able to share the Eucharist with folks who were not able to come to church, has been such an incredible gift for me. I've asked some of our parishioners to give us a report card. Below are a few of the comments:

We were connected with kind, respectful, caring people to help us out from time to time.

It was helpful and comforting to receive Communion while I was in Rehab recuperating from a serious fall.

Thanks for helping us find resources. We'll look into them and thanks for visiting with mom and dad. The visits really mean a lot to them! - John

Martha's visit to our house made me think about my obligation to our survivors concerning our personal information. This includes which agencies, which relatives and friends, which service suppliers must be notified. A recent report about someone's problems with cemetery authorization made me realize I have no paperwork on our preferences. We have good strong computer passwords, but our family doesn't know how to locate them. Who wants which of our possessions? I will arrange a family meeting to record this information. Thanks to Martha for getting me to think about all this.

The Home Communion has been so meaningful for both Ralph and I. We wouldn't have this if you didn't come. Thank you. - Ralph and Joyce

We were new and didn't have pressing health needs, but we wanted to share our gifts with others. I was encouraged to participate in the choir and since I didn't like driving at night, rides were arranged. This has culminated in having my group Windsor Winds being invited to provide sing-along entertainment for the first Community Café in September - Randy

I wanted to continue on the pastoral care team as a lay minister of Home Communion, but in order to renew my license, I had to take five hours of online Safe Church training. I don't have a computer or computer skills. Martha patiently sat with me and helped me to navigate the tests on my own at the church. –Carol

Thanks so much for helping mom stay in contact with the church. Since I'm so far away, there's only so much I can arrange on the phone. Mom really loves St. Martin's thanks for helping to get her to the services.

I'm so amazed at what good contact you keep with us. It's so good to feel so cared for by the church.

When I stopped driving, it was suggested that I call Faith in Action for transportation. The volunteers were so friendly. We shared conversations and soon found we had common acquaintances. It was just like having a friend pick me up.
